Since I have been a member of our AARP Chapter #3689, there are so many attention-grabbing people I wanted to know more about. So when I was asked to write an article for the Chronicle, I thought this is an excellent opportunity to learn about members with an interview - which it should be an interesting topic. So here is my interview with **Karen Clark**:

Cordelia: Where did you grow up and how did you get to the Raleigh area?

<u>Karen</u>: I was born in Chicago and moved to North Carolina when I was seven. I have lived here most of my life. **Cordelia**: Did you come from a small or large family and tell us about your family now.

Karen: My father came here from Denmark so I don't know any of my family members on my father's side. My mother's family is of Danish origin also and she was not in my life because she had mental illness. My brother and I grew up mostly in North Carolina. Of course, since I was blind, I had to go to an institutional school and did not spend much time in a community.

Cordelia: You are such an intelligent person, tell us about your educational background.

Karen: I graduated from the Governor Morehead School and then went to East Carolina University. My degree was in music therapy. I only used that degree when I taught preschool music at a local church. Mostly I worked in consumer protection and for an insurance company typing up claims documents.

Cordelia: You are so knowledgeable regarding politics, has that always been an interest of yours?

Karen: I became interested in disability rights in the mid-nineties and participated in a local consumer group to advocate for disability concerns and then I became involved in the American's with Disabilities legislation. I also worked for an agency that advocated for disability rights. During that time, I became active in AARP and got involved in AARP issues. I got involved in politics so I could learn more about how the legislative process worked. So I started with disability rights issues and then got involved in issues for seniors. Many of the same issues are included in both these areas. James Hines of our Chapter was my mentor for AARP politics. I truly believe that we have to get involved in politics as if our lives depend on it, because it does.

Cordelia: What is your favorite, food, book, and type of music?

Karen: I don't have a favorite book or music. I have authors that I like such as Jodi Picoult, Barbara Kingsolver, and most recently Bonnie Garmus. For fun, I have been reading Jana de Leon. Her books are delightful and funny and I find myself laughing out loud when I read them. I like most types of music but my favorite music is music that I can sing along with.

Cordelia: Tell us something you would like for us to know about you.

Karen: I want to be involved in my community. I want to find a way to be involved in cohousing. I want my life to be one of sharing and giving. I will always be involved and speak out wherever I can. I believe that Martin Nieomuller spoke truth when he said his famous quote about speaking out.

"They came for the Catholics and I didn't speak up.

Then they came for the trade unionists and I didn't speak out.

Then they came for the Jews, and I didn't speak out.

Then they came for me, and there was no one left to speak out."

That may not be exactly right but the gist is that I believe I am called to speak up if there is an injustice.



Cordelia: Did you come from a small or large family and tell us about your family now.

Edmond: I was the youngest of three children in our family. We grew up in Olean, NY which is about 70 miles south of Buffalo, NY. Gayle and I have 2 adult sons and 5 adult grandchildren. We were foster parents to several pre adoptive infants when we lived in Syracuse. They were generally with us for 4-5 months before they were adopted. Our last foster infant who is now an adult continues to be a part of our family. We have lived in Syracuse NY, Rochester NY and we moved to Raleigh, NC after I retired.

Cordelia: You are such an intelligent person, tell us about your educational background.

Edmond: graduated from Olean HS and worked at JC Penny part time while a senior. I worked full time for over a year after graduating high school before attending Delhi Tech which is now known as SUNY Delhi. I was fortunate to receive a grant from Delhi and enrolled in the Civil Tech program. At Delhi, I was on the Dean's list, worked for one of the engineering professors and was corresponding secretary of my fraternity.

Cordelia: I know you have had an extensive career, what are some of the positions you have had?

Edmond: After receiving my Civil Technology degree, I worked as a draftsman for several engineering firms and an architectural firm in Syracuse, NY. I started doing structural design work in the firms. My supervisors encouraged me to get my NY State Professional Engineering license. I had to list and document the structural design work that I did in the last 8 years to apply to take the PE Exam. I passed the first part of the PE exam. Then, I had an opportunity to work at Eastman Kodak in Rochester, NY. I worked in Kodak's Engineering Department as a designer. I took and passed part 2 of the PE exam and became a licensed NY State Professional Engineer. My dream came true. I was then promoted to the Structural Engineering Department of Kodak. I retired after over 26 great years at Kodak as a senior Structural Engineer. **Cordelia:** Do you enjoy traveling and are there places you found interesting?

Edmond: Yes, I enjoy traveling. I've enjoyed canoeing in the Adirondacks with my family, camping with my family in New York state and parts of New England. I enjoyed the vacation when we stayed at the Grand Canyon. It was beautiful. We met a Native American at an overlook of the Grand Canyon. We told him how beautiful it is. He told us 'it is only a hole in the ground'. He told us that his dream was to see Niagara Falls. We have been there numerous times and talked to him about it. LEGISLATIVE

According to North Carolina Minority Leader, Representative Robert Reives, the 2023 Legislative Session has come to a close, except for committee meetings. In the 2023 session, two major pieces of Legislation were passed and enacted into law, the 2023-24 Budget and Redistricting. The Governor did sign the budget bill into law. The Redistricting bill did not require his signature.

The General Assembly 2023-24 Budget was less than favorable for Wake County Seniors. The current budget did not provide a COLA-Cost of Living Allowance to retirees. Retirees were given to a one-time bonus of four percent (4%) of their annuity and a portion of that money was returned back to the treasury in the form of personal income tax payment. Another portion of the budget that may help seniors comes through a personal income tax reduction to 2.49% if revenue is triggered each year for five years.

The other major piece of legislation that could have a negative impact on Wake County seniors is the Redistricting Maps. The Maps have been drawn to include changes to the legislative and the congressional districts. The new Maps give the Republican Party a majority of the districts which will increase their seats from seven to ten seats. The four other districts are drawn to give the Democrats three seats. The one other district gives the Republicans an advantage to win that seat too and that means the Republican Party will control eleven seats out of fourteen and the Democrats will only control three seats; however, the new maps have been challenged in the court by the NAACP.

In conclusion, Wake County senior economic growth is not looking positive under the current GOP majority leadership and may require seniors to make some changes in personal budgets.
